Research

I have generated a total of over HK\$17 million research funding. Of the 47 research projects I have had secured, I am the principal investigator of 38 of these research projects. 24 of the projects are considered competitive research grants, of which 8 of them are competitively peer-

reviewed. I received 3 CERG/GRF grant in the capacity of PI in 2007 (#30), 2014 (#3), and 2016 (#1), 1 GRF grant in the capacity of Co-I in 2015, and 1 Health and Health Service Research Fund as a Co-I in 2010 (#21). In the past six years since I have assumed full professorship, I have obtained about 30 research projects in the capacity of PI and have acquired a total of over HK\$12 million. 36 of the 47 projects are directly related to clinical research on the application of cognitive behaviour therapy (CBT) in diverse groups of Chinese clients such as people with depression, anxiety disorders, elderly with depression, parents with emotional problems, youth with psychosis, problem gamblers, cancer patients, drug abusers, children with anxiety problems and etc. Other projects are related to mental health of Chinese people, and migration and mental health.

Research interests

My research interests fall into cognitive-behaviour therapy; evidence-based practice in mental health, mental health promotion and mental health issues among migrants.

I have published a total of about 100 journal articles. More than half of the refereed articles fall into Q1 and Q2 journal categories. Many of them appear in top social work journals such as British Journal of Social Work (4 articles), Research on Social Work Practice (5 articles) and Child and Family Social Work (2 articles); top psychiatry journals such as Depression and Anxiety (1 article), Australian and New Zealand Journal of Psychiatry (4 articles) and Social Psychiatry and Psychiatric Epidemiology (4 articles); and top nursing, rehabilitation and social science journals such as International Journal of Nursing Studies (1 article), Journal of Intellectual Disability Research (4 articles), Social Science and Medicine (1 article). Over 65 articles were written solely by myself as the sole or first author. The H-index is 15.

Books and manuals

In the past years, I have written a total of 15 books and manuals, 4 of them are refereed books and 2 are in English. The book “*Clinical case management for people with mental illness: A bio-psychosocial vulnerability-stress model*” has been adopted as a textbook and has been favorably reviewed in prestigious social work and psychiatry journals. Knowledge Transfer

Since the establishment of a CBT research and training unit in 2007, my colleagues and I have been engaging in running CBT training workshops and clinical supervision for professionals in the fields of social work, occupational therapy, nursing and physiotherapy. The objectives of this research and training unit are: (1) develop evidence-based and culturally relevant CBT models for Chinese clients, (2) set standards for clinical competence in CBT practice for Chinese clients, (3) train practitioners in acquiring culturally-attuned CBT theories and techniques. As we are the only organization in Hong Kong which is providing such culturally attuned CBT practice, our training and clinical supervision have been well sought after. Over 45 training workshops (half-day, one to three days in duration) have been organized. In addition, we have also been providing one to two years clinical supervision for agency staff and professionals who are interested in pursuing a certification as a cognitive behaviour therapist. Professionals who completed the training are issued certificates in CBT (Level I and II). Such workshop and clinical supervision have been run in Australia, China, Hong Kong and Macau by our unit or through agency sponsorship. Lastly, between 2010 and 2013, we have provided 12 public seminars in Hong Kong with about 2000 participants benefitting from these seminars. Over 200 clients have received individual and/or group counselling from our unit during the same period of time.
