

## CURRICULUM VITAE (APPENDIX 3)

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**SYNOPSIS**

I received my Bachelor's and Master's degree in Social Sciences at the University of Hong Kong. I pursued my Ph.D. in Ideology and Discourse Analysis at the University of Essex (UK) as a British Commonwealth Scholar. I joined the Department of Social Work & Social Administration as a social work field supervisor in 1985, was promoted to Assistant Professor in 1998, re-titled as Associate Professor in 2001 and became Professor in July 2016.

My pedagogical and teaching philosophy as a social work academic has always been about creating different forms of knowledge concerning gender and sexuality whilst encouraging my students, my research participants and the community to do the same. This has particular relevance for the discipline of social work which as a profession is typically concerned with the disadvantaged and vulnerable. The majority of adult clients are female.

With reference to a post-structuralist feminist perspective, the focus of my research and scholarship is the development of a theory of gender and sexuality that challenges existing conceptualization of intimacy and modernity leading to an epistemological reconstruction that does not grant *a priori* supremacy to scientific knowledge produced in the Global North. In my work, I have combined conventional with innovative and creative forms of knowledge production and exchange that are useful to help me achieve three aims: (1) To engage in an intercultural dialogue through my own experiments with different critical knowledge production and exchange practices; (2) To make use of these reflections in cross-cultural comparisons that will deepen these epistemological reflections; (3) To use these perspectives to precipitate constructive change both at individual and community levels in Hong Kong society and China.

My work has been published in high impact factor social science journals including *Sex Roles* (2014IF: 1.735; Ranked 5<sup>th</sup> among 116 journals in Gender Studies in SJR2014), *Journal of Sex Research* (2014IF: 2.695; Ranked 4<sup>th</sup> among 116 journals in Gender Studies in SJR2014), *Journal of Interpersonal Violence* (2014IF: 1.210; Ranked 44<sup>th</sup> among 184 journals in Applied Psychology; ranked in 46<sup>th</sup> among 247 journals in Clinical Psychology in SJR2014), *Violence Against Women* (IF: 1.191; Ranked 10<sup>th</sup> among 116 journals in Gender Studies in SJR2014), *Culture, Health & Sexuality* (IF: 1.784; Ranked 16<sup>th</sup> among 229 journals in Health (Social Science); ranked 70<sup>th</sup> among 460 journals in Public Health, Environmental and Occupational Health in SJR 2014)

and *The Sociological Review* (2014 IF: 0.875; .Ranked in 162<sup>nd</sup> among 928 journals in Sociology and Political Science in SJR2014), *Asian Women* (2014 IF: 1.848, Ranked 5<sup>th</sup> among 41 journals in Women's Studies (JCR2014). All these are top journals (Q1) in the field.

My research in gender and sexuality has been supported by prestigious competitive grants including four GRF grants, three as PI (2008, 2011, 2013) and one as Co-I (2015), one ESRC grant (2009), two teaching development grants (2014, 2009), one Knowledge Exchange Grants (2010) and one EXCEL3 funding (2011), a matching grant (2015) and a government grant to identify discrimination against sexual minorities in Hong Kong in the context of proposed changes in legislation against various forms of discrimination (2015).

I have thus been invited to international platforms (49 international conferences) and many overseas training workshops to present my experiences as a scholar-artist and scholar-activist especially with regard to how I combine empirical research with theoretical reflection in studying erotic justice and global cognitive justice. Renowned scholars have also come to Hong Kong to attend my conferences to learn from us and listen to what Hong Kong people have to say.

As a social work academic, I am also concerned about translating these theoretical concepts into concrete social actions leading to a new concept of justice that takes into account gender and intimacy in order to focus on “overlooked injustices” in the private sphere and intimate relationships. My work calls for the imagination of new modalities of social action beyond those that are historically recognized or culturally sanctioned as being “political” to include various forms of cultural interventions.

I am proud to be promoted to professorship in July 2016 and given the recognition that I have actively contributed to key aspects of HKU's mission through research, teaching, service and knowledge exchange in the field of gender, sexuality, diversity and innovative qualitative research methodologies. This recognition has further strengthened my determination to continue my active involvement in (1) innovative, interdisciplinary and collaborative international teams in gender and sexuality studies; (2) involvement in the HKU Women's Studies Research Centre, the current HeForShe initiative for the promotion of gender equality in all aspects of university life, from teaching to research, and policy practice; (3) the common core curriculum with a special focus on China and the development of a new curriculum on gender and diversity and encouraging the development of inter-disciplinary courses and online education.

My academic profile and unique scholarly expertise is in line with the “(3+1) Is strategy of HKU and I look forward to working with my colleagues in furthering the university's mission.

**C. Creative Works****C1. Documentary Films**

I have produced 58 documentary films ranging in length from 7 to 65 minutes. These documentary films were produced through a new visual ethnographic practice which combines the camera as a research tool with the practices of an intimate dialogue of action-reflection-participatory engagement process on issues of intimacy, including taboo subjects. They were not objective recordings of data or just for knowledge exchange, but an active part of the research process as well as experiments for developing the idea of "dialogic filming" as a research method.

Some of the films produced from this project have been shown in Hong Kong as well as at conferences and invited talks in China, Asia, the USA and Europe. I have disseminated these research based creative works through numerous film screenings and talks in Guangzhou, Beijing, Bali, Hanoi, Tokyo, Chicago, York and Milan and received international recognition on these occasions:

1. Three of our films were selected by the Sguardi Altrove Film Festival in March 2010 and we were invited to Milan to present them. We were able to increase the understanding

of Hong Kong Chinese middle aged women, raise their profile internationally and change the world's perception of them.

2. *Hello Mimi* was also selected to be shown at the Davis Feminist Film Festival: A grassroots festival of short films from around the world on April, 15, 2011.
3. *My Favorite in Hong Kong* is a video-screening project initiated by an artist collective from Hong Kong known as the What If Artist Group. My film *Love in a Dream* was selected together with five video works by different artists in Hong Kong and screened in June 2011 in various Norwegian cities including Oslo, Tromso and Bergen.
4. *Love and Punish* and *Twins Café* were selected by Renaissance Foundation Film Festival and the two films were screened at Broadway Cinemateque on Dec., 9, 2012.
5. Many of these films have been used as teaching resources for many courses at different universities in HK, China, Japan, US, Canada and UK to engage students in a dialogue to understand intimacy practices and innovative research methodologies.
6. A new film called "Politics 1001: Scholars in resistance" will be produced in March, 2017. This film documents the participation of our panel in the Nomination Committee (Higher Education sector) for the 2017 Chief Executive election with a focus on women's experience in HK politics.

#### Cl.1 *Kong-lo Chronicles* 港佬列傳 (2014-2015) Total 3 films

Exploring the most monumental protest in Hong Kong history, these films contribute to the analysis of social movements as well as the connections between politics and social life.

##### 1. *Kong-Lo Chronicles Part 1 (Pre-Umbrella Movement)*

This film is about 6 Hong Kong men, a taxi driver, a fireman, a journalist, a village head, a small trader and a civil servant. I paired up each guy with another guy from a very different background to examine their ideals of masculinity through inviting them to talk about what constitutes a "bad" guy (and the different kinds of bad behaviours that men identify as worst crimes in intimacy) by way of asking them how they feel about being a "*pok guy*" (Cantonese slang term for a bastard or cad that is often used as a curse and a derogatory remark). The ways in which they talk about what makes a guy a bad guy or in Cantonese a "*pok guy*" somehow always led to talks about politics. The way they define themselves for or against the Occupy Central Movement is illuminating of the complex accounts of the relationship between masculinity and heterosexuality.

##### 2. *Kong-Lo Chronicles Part 2 (Post-Umbrella Movement)*

In the post-umbrella movement phase, I interviewed these 3 pairs of men again to explore further their observations and experiences of the occupation. The dramatic moments and events that people have seen or participated in during the occupation have helped elucidate how the specificity of Hong Kong politics can provide us with

new analytical insight for looking at social issues, the making of self-identity, and intimacy.

### 3. Politics and practices of intimacy Part 3 (Evaluation of the Umbrella Movement)

Two focus groups were conducted with 18 participants from all walks of life in June, 2015 to investigate the consequences of the umbrella movement (for both participants and opponents) on family life and intimate relationships.

## C2. *Research-based Multi-media Theatre*

I produced and performed the first research- based theatre “Sex Love and Hope: Ho Style” with 6 shows at the HK Arts Centre involving 20 artist groups and cultural groups from May 3-6, 2013. Total audience: 460.

I produced and performed my second research- based theatre “Labouring Women Devised Theatre” at the HKU theatre with 13 women artists on April 22, 2016. Total audience: 100. This performance is an exploration into how collaborative focus group analysis can be combined with the theatre to create new platforms of story telling and alternative ways of facilitating exchanges between the researcher and the researched. 3 films were produced documenting the show and the reflections of the participants on their experiences.

- C2.1 *Collaborative script creating workshops*: The stories of the middle aged women in Hong Kong were presented by me to the director, Eric Tang and the 3 young artists from Skyhigh Creative Partners: A Jockey Club Initiative for Innovative Minds, (a social enterprise aiming to train young people as artists). In the Labouring Women Devised Theatre, the life stories

of the 13 women activists were also elicited through a series of workshops conducted by the Director to develop the scripts using a collaborative participatory method.

- C2.2 *Performing the stories of the research participants and the researcher:* A series of workshops was organized to help us perform the stories of these women including sex workers as well as our own stories with the support of music, dance and various kinds of theatrical arrangements.
- C2.3 *Focus group with sex workers:* A focus group was conducted with JJJ Association, a sex workers' organisation to listen to their stories and use the narratives to create the scripts used in the theatre. The project created opportunities for the sexual minority communities to provide potent perspectives that are often under-represented, overlooked, distorted or ignored by mainstream society.
- C2.4 *Documentary films:* Short films (each 7 minutes) on Hong Kong women's love and sex life were produced and shown at the shows. Street interviews with young people and couples and their attitude towards gay people and transgendered people were included.
- C2.5 *Open forums on multiple sexual relationships:* I conducted Q & A discussions to explore the audience's attitude and experiences of alternative models of relationships and the moral dilemmas involved.
- C2.6 *Qualitative feedback for measuring impact:* We created documentary films covering the whole show (with films, dance, open forum and dialogue with the audience) and the feedback of the NGOs, which demonstrates how we can produce evidence about the impact of our work through qualitative methods. The films with the voices of the participants on multiple sexual relationships have become extremely valuable knowledge for research classes and courses on gender, sex, love and family. We aim to build their capacity in how they can achieve their goals including art-based innovative research methods. The expanded approaches, as the outcomes suggested, are effective in raising awareness of social issues and sex topics. We also documented the audience feedback towards the show on the Facebook page and my personal page. These have become important sources of collecting feedback and documenting them has become a regular practice in addition to standard evaluation forms.

## **TEACHING AND LEARNING**

Regarding teaching and learning, I have received a number of awards that demonstrate my ability in effectively transferring my knowledge to students. Our students voted me their most popular and charismatic lecturer in 1997 and 1998. I also received the Outstanding Teaching Award (1999-2000). In recognition of my leadership in curriculum development

and excellent teaching quality, I was awarded the title of University Teaching Fellow in 2002.

My involvement with the Hubert Project in the past 2 years is an indication of my long standing interest and concern in developing innovative teaching methods and a culturally sensitive curriculum. Hubert Project is a collaborative project among 3 institutions and training partners: Humphrey School of Public Affairs, University of Minnesota, Partnership for African Social & Governance Research and Faculty of Social Sciences, HKU that provides public affairs educators the opportunity to create and share multimedia learning materials including short videos and cases. Intended audiences include faculty and instructors teaching public policy, public administration, and nonprofit management, as well as nonprofit, government and philanthropic consultants, and other leadership development trainers. The cases are open source materials and they will be used globally for teaching. I am one of few scholars who have contributed so many cases to the project as a pioneer willing to devote my time and effort to producing films important for e-learning and also making the voices of the disadvantaged heard to an international audience. My involvement as a gender and sexuality expert has also made an important contribution by conceptualising “public affairs” to include gender and sexuality issues that also have public policy implications.

I am one of the very few academics in Hong Kong able to teach such a wide range of subjects from Love, Marriage and Sex in Modern China, Qualitative Research, Art-based Inquiries to Modern Social Theory. ### *H2. Courses Development and Teaching Innovations*

I have developed new courses that will broaden the boundary of the social work curriculum:

- H2.1 Culture, Media and Identity: I have designed and taught a new course in cultural studies for the part-time BSW students. The students were encouraged to make their own films. The best two films were selected and shown at the Science Museum on June, 6, 2011.
- H2.2 Love, Sex and Marriage in Modern China: I launched a new common core course and received positive feedback. I will continue to develop this course. The students were encouraged to make their own films as their group project. These films were shown at the Creativity College on April, 11, 2011.
- H2.3 I was invited by the Common Core Director to share the challenge of pursuing intellectual rigor in the Common Core Curriculum through Love, Sex and Marriage in Modern China as an example of practice from the China: Culture, State and Society Area of Inquiry at the Common Core Forum held on May 27, 2011
- H2.4 Practice research in human services: I designed a new course on qualitative research for the Master of Social Sciences for the Marriage and Family Therapy programme. It was a most rewarding experience to develop new ways of understanding families in Hong Kong. I also supervised two students from the course on their clinical papers.

- H2.5** SOWK7007: Social Work and Applied Social Science Research Methods: Theory and Applications is the first course to provide advanced training in qualitative studies. The course starts with helping students to construct a theoretical puzzle to assist them in re-thinking the role of knowledge in social work theory, research, and practice. This inquiry includes the conditions of possibility for knowledge, how knowledge is constructed and legitimated, the articulation of knowledge claims, and how knowledge is managed and used, including how it is marketed and distributed. Students will critically interrogate academic knowledge production, including established epistemological positions such as positivist, constructivist and critical theory, and assess their validity and relevance within the context of social work studies.

### ***H4. Curriculum Development for Research Post-graduates***

As the Director and Deputy Director of the Research Postgraduate Programme of the department in the past decade, I have introduced major changes to the programme and have made it one of the biggest and the best research and teaching programmes in the Faculty and the University with 100 students in 2015. Our major achievements include:

1. We initiated a new way of financing the programme that combines University funding with department funding and contributions from the supervisor's funding which has made it possible for us to increase our intake and encourage all our colleagues to recruit high calibre students who can help develop and expand our research areas.
2. We have become the biggest research post-graduate programme in the Faculty as well as one of the best in the university in terms of student completion rate and total research output. In 2015, our rpgs are co-authors for 33 publications including articles in prestigious journals, e.g. Journal of Applied Gerontology, British Journal of Psychiatry and Comprehensive Psychiatry, etc.,
3. Our RPGs have also gained many awards and fellowships during their studies: Outstanding Second Career Award organized by Lion Rock Junior Chamber and Tung Wah Group of Hospitals; Outstanding Investigator Award organized by International Alzheimer's Disease Conference, American General Benevolent Union International



Scholarship, National Outstanding Professional Social Work Leader, Ministry of Civil Affairs of the People's Republic of China and the Junior Fulbright Awards.

4. Our RPGs are now teaching at various prestigious universities including Fudan University, Carlton University, Renmin University, East China Normal University and University of Southern California.
5. We organized on-going exchange programmes with different universities in the world including King's College London, Smith College and University of Pennsylvania.
6. We initiated the first Faculty Research Post-graduate Conference with the participation of Nankai, Fudan and Sun Yet Sen University.
7. We initiated the Faculty's first handbook for RPGs that lay down the expected standards of practice for supervisors.
8. We wrote and edited the first case book to introduce *Problem-based Learning to China* involving 10 RPGs who were trained to design curriculum and learn new teaching methods with the aim of introducing new pedagogical approaches to China.
9. We involved four RPGs in teaching courses and training workshops local and overseas, including, for example, a course on Qualitative Research for the MSW students in Fudan in April to May, 2004.
10. I chair the Departmental Research Post-graduate Committee and have mentored two Assistant Professors, Dr. Vivian Lou and Dr. Elsie Yan to be the Deputy Directors and leaders in post-graduate education.
11. We introduced major changes to the research postgraduate curriculum which include: Mounting six new inter-disciplinary courses at the Departmental, Faculty and Graduate School levels; introducing advanced quantitative and qualitative research courses into the department; restructuring the research post-graduate seminars for the confirmation of their candidature to encourage theoretical and critical thinking.
12. We pioneered training in advanced qualitative research methodologies. In curriculum reform and design, I have created a new course (SOWK 7007: Social Work and Applied Social Science Research Methods: Theory and Applications) for the research post-graduates. This is the first time that the department has launched an advanced course on qualitative research, championing the in-depth investigation of the relevance of social theory and social research. There was positive feedback on the course especially in relation to broadening students' understanding of the scope of academic study and enabling them to devise a programme of research for their own academic career. We are one of the few, if not the only department in Hong Kong with advanced qualitative methodological training for research post-graduates, thus we have attracted RPGs from other universities to attend our classes.

### **H5. New Methods for Assessing Students' Performance**

1. *Art as a Work of Life*: My first attempt to develop a new assessment method was in 2006 when organizing a performance at HKU's theatre with 115 performers (HKU students in FOSS0015 *Sexing Culture and Identity: When the Supergirls meet the Metrosexuals* Course) who were made to put on 11 visual arts and 13 drama acts, under the byline of "When the Supergirls Meet the Metrosexuals" at the end of the course as their final group project presentation. Since then, I have explored how to encourage students to make documentary films as part of their assessment. I was invited to present my experience to the common core teachers on the university's common core forums. 2. 3. Acting as our esteemed panel of adjudicators, celebrities from the local industry also participated in the event, including Wong Yiu Ming (singer), Gaybird (K C. Leung, composer/producer/multi-media artist), Jason Choi (composer / arranger / artist from People Mountain People Sea), Savio Woo (General Manager from People Mountain People Sea, musician/video artist), Anita Hui (Art Administrator, pianist), Gene Miao (architect), Gary Ngan (DJ, Metro broadcast), Dr. Anita Chan (HK Institute of Education) and Cliff Mok (film maker, animation artist).
4. This event would not have been possible without the support of 4 consultant artists: 有耳非文/Arumimihifumi, Luke Ching (photographer/installation artist), Wilson Lee (photographer, Son Gallery) and Chris Lau (multi-media artist) who conducted more than 20 experience workshops and countless consultant sessions for the students to help them prepare for the show.

### ***K3. New Community Groups***

I have brought three community groups together for the development of democratic movement in Hong Kong by means of encouraging reflections and discussions of relevant philosophical concepts as well as expanding the different fronts of democratic revolution to include different life domains and issues in everyday life.

1. University of Democracy-to-come (未來民主大學): We have also published a book *Umbrella Politics Quartet* that combines philosophical investigations on democracy with reflections on our participation in the umbrella movement that hopefully will create some impact on civil society. This community university has played a significant role in civic education. We have also taken the lead to organize a conference on evaluating the umbrella movement with the major social groups and organisations in the pro-democracy alliance on Sept., 3, 2015.
2. Hong Kong Shield (文化界監察暴力行動組): In response to the umbrella movement, I have also initiated the Hong Kong Shield for violence monitoring involving more than 60 artists, academics and celebrities who can be the moral witness against all the explicit and implicit violence that we have seen in Hong Kong.
3. Reel Women Hong Kong (女影香港): My vision for founding this organization was to promote women's writing and film making. We have chosen to screen some international films and unique local films, establishing a film platform outside the mainstream media industry. We have worked with local community groups, schools, and artists to encourage women's self-expressions and creations. The goal is not only to provide educational opportunities for various groups but also to enrich feminist film theory and gender studies discourse to raise the standard of our media environment. Our main activities include screening and post-screening forums. Our work was rated as most satisfactory and we have just submitted an application for new funding to the Art Development Council so that we can expand our work and do more for the community.

numerous presentations to varied professional audiences, including academic departments of other universities and welfare agencies.

1. *AIDS education*: For six years, I served as the Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson of the local AIDS charity. I have lead the organization through a significant period of growth and development from a small but well-intentioned community response to a professional NGO with a strategic response to one of the leading contemporary global threats to community health. In recognition of my efforts in this area I was elected one of the “Ten Most Memorable Persons in the Past Twenty Years in the AIDS Field” in Hong Kong, in a poll jointly held by the Government’s Red Ribbon Centre and the Ming Pao newspaper in 2005.

My 6 years of service on the Board of Directors of AIDS Concern was during a period when AIDS was still seen by many in Hong Kong as a ‘gay plague’ and gay people routinely experienced discrimination. Under my leadership AIDS Concern was one of the most important, active and innovative of the organizations engaged in AIDS advocacy work and service provision. As Chairperson, I introduced the direct debit fund-raising considered the most important step in generating a stable and predictable income that the organization has ever taken. 2. *Gender Identity Team*: I am one of only two social assessors in Hong Kong. For more than a decade I was part of the Queen Mary Hospital’s Gender Identity Team conducting social assessments and counselling people applying for gender reassignment surgery.
3. *Social critique*: My involvement in NGOs and local grassroots movements has been invaluable in helping me see how issues relating to local political hierarchies and gender politics are connected to global forces. This, plus my past volunteer work with Breakthrough and my involvement in radio broadcasting for nearly two decades has been an asset for curriculum reform, teaching innovations and ensuring the continuing and ongoing relevance of the social work curriculum content. It has also enhanced the visibility of the Department in the community in commenting on social issues.
4. *Anti-discriminatory ordinance*: I have received a government grant to launch a territory wide study on the experience of discrimination by sexual minorities in HK in collaboration with Policy 21. 200+ interviews were conducted. The report has been submitted to the Constitutional and Mainland Affairs Bureau (CMAB) and the Advisory Group on Eliminating Discrimination against sexual minorities.
5. *Alternative discourses on love, sex & marriage*: There are over 70 items in the press related to my views on gender and sexual diversity, different models of relationships and alternative family forms (more than 150,000 words in total) that have appeared in both Mainland and Hong Kong in the past decade.
